PROPOSED MINUTES OF THE BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP PUBLIC LIBRARY BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Bloomfield Township Public Library Oakland County, Michigan Tuesday, April 22, 2025 Library Board Room

At 7:00 p.m. the Regular Meeting of the Bloomfield Township Public Library Board of Trustees was called to order by President Shane Spradlin.

Shane Spradlin requested <u>Item 9d</u> be removed from the consent agenda for regular discussion.

Upon discussion, a motion was made by Judy Lindstrom and seconded by Joan Luksik <u>TO</u> <u>APPROVE THE ORDER OF ITEMS AS LISTED ON THE AGENDAS WITH THE</u> <u>FOLLOWING ITEMS REMOVED FROM CONSENT AGENDA AS FOLLOWS: 9D</u>

A vote was taken for approval of the motion. Ayes: Gillman, Lindstrom, Luksik, Murray, and Spradlin Nays: None MOTION CARRIED

PRESIDENT'S VERBAL REPORT:

President Shane Spradlin remarked on the public comments. One was regarding "lots of 'woke' children's books." He said that the Library is not the arbiter of wokeness but to be mindful of the constituency and address people's concerns. The person made this comment without providing contact information. He remarked on a patron's enthusiasm for supporting the Library through their tax dollars. He introduced a new agenda, with the budget being outside of the consent agenda, for ease of comment. He also remarked on the budget and expressed the management team did a phenomenal job of expense control.

DIRECTOR'S VERBAL REPORT:

Director Moon introduced Kathy Wolosiewicz, the new Finance Coordinator, who began on

March 31. Ms. Wolsiewicz shared some of her work history. Erin Brzezinski of Plante Moran is providing additional training a couple of days a week.

The Library scheduled its audit a couple of months later this year because of this change in personnel. The audit fieldwork will take place in mid-June, and the draft audit and financial statements will be presented in September. Ms. Brezinski will assist with the audit fieldwork.

The new surveillance cameras are all installed and running. The plan is to give view-only access to the Persons-in-Charge group. Footage will only be downloaded and shared with the Director's permission. Footage will be provided to the police upon approval of the Director and will not be given to patrons.

Director Moon was a guest on the Distracted Librarians podcast for a conversation about MeLCat and how the potential canceling of IMLS funds may impact it. She has heard that there are ideas on how to keep MeLCat funded through other means.

The Library Network has made available red cards, which are cards in various languages that provide information about immigrants' rights—each library could select two languages. This Library selected Chinese and Arabic to better serve its patrons for whom English is a second language. The cards are to be used to answer reference questions about this topic – they will not be put out on display.

6. BUDGET:

Director Moon clarified information about some vendors.

- Martha McGee is the Volunteer Coordinator, who purchases items for the Library Shop and the Volunteer Reception and is reimbursed by the Library.
- C2AE is the architecture and design firm that is doing the redesign project. A certain percentage of the overall fee will be charged to the Library each month.
- Rolls Mechanical maintains the HVAC as well as plumbing and electrical, though most recent bills were for HVAC because two boilers were out-of-order.
- Applied Innovation services the printers, and the charge was part of the routine maintenance costs.
- Augies is the janitorial company.
- TechLogic manages the Automated Materials Handling (AMH) machine, and this is the annual service maintenance.
- Trustee Joy Murray inquired about Recollect. This is a subscription fee and a portion of the implementation fee. It is for a content management service that creates a website that the Library can manage and upload information to on an ongoing basis. It takes what the staff digitizes and makes it more interactive. This makes the historical archives of the Library more accessible to the public.

President Spradlin commented on the budget. The revenues were 2% over, driven by insurance rebates. Expenditures, including facilities, personnel, library services, travel, and other operating costs, were all below budget. He thought the team did a wonderful job of keeping within budget. There was also a 4.7% yield on investments.

Upon discussion, a motion was made by Dani Gillman, seconded by Joy Murray to <u>APPROVE</u> <u>THE REMAINING ITEMS ON THE CONSENT AGENDA.</u>

12. NEW BUSINESS:

12a. Library as Regular Precinct Polling Place for Bloomfield Township

In June 2023, the Library Board of Trustees approved a request from Bloomfield Township Clerk Martin Brook for the Library to be an early voting location for Bloomfield Township, the City of Birmingham, and Southfield Township. Since then, the Library has hosted three elections, including the November 2024 Presidential Election. During that election, more than 9,000 voters cast their ballots over nine days of early voting.

While the Library served effectively as a polling place, observations were made regarding parking limitations and the significant demands placed on library staff. These topics were discussed at two post-election debrief meetings. Ideas for mitigating those drawbacks and for improving the experience for all were discussed.

Recently, Mr. Brook approached Library Administration to ask if the Library would consider being a regular precinct polling location on Election Day. The Township is reconfiguring polling places for a multitude of reasons and identified the Library as an ideal site. Election Specialist Catarina Yankey provided more details about the request.

If this proposal is approved, the Library will sign a contract with Bloomfield Township's Clerk's office for a one-year period. This gives both parties a chance to evaluate the arrangement each year.

Upon discussion, a motion was made by Shane Spradlin, seconded by Judy Lindstrom <u>THAT</u> <u>BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP PUBLIC LIBRARY BE AN ELECTION DAY REGULAR</u> <u>PRECINCT POLLING LOCATION.</u>

Joy Murray praised the increase in circulation statistics.

She inquired about how the public might be informed about what might be affected with IMLS funding cuts. Director Moon said that much is unknown at this point. There are conversations at The Library Network, the Library of Michigan, and elsewhere to continue to fund MeLCat, the databases, and the training. The Library is waiting to see what happens and then decisions will be made. The funding is good through September of this year.

The Michigan Library Association is coordinating the annual library advocacy day on April 30 in Lansing with Assistant Director Katherine Bryant joining the effort. The day involves meetings with various representatives to discuss the importance of Michigan's public libraries and maintaining funding levels, with more funding at a state level. Dani Gillman said that local representatives are keeping office hours at Bloomfield Township Public Library.

Joan Luksik inquired if the Spaces project included plans for a makerspace or a library of things. There has been discussion about having equipment for these things, but not a dedicated area for just one of them.

Dani Gillman inquired about the vending company. There is nothing to report.

The Friends Annual Meeting is tomorrow, April 23. The Friends raised \$5,800 at their most

recent sale.

Joan Luksik and Dani Gillman remarked that the Volunteer Reception on April 17 was lovely.

The next board meeting will be on Tuesday, May 20, 2025 at 7:00p.m.

May 2025

For the fourth year, the Library will be a venue for the **Great Lakes Chamber Music Festival** in June. We are hosting three Artistic Encounters, which are public coaching sessions that give the audience a behind-the-scenes look at what it takes to be a professional musician. In addition, the Community Room will serve as a rehearsal venue for other festival artists as needed, and these rehearsals may be open to the public as well. We are pleased to host these world-class musicians at events that our patrons love.

This is the first year in many years that Staff Development Day (SDD) has not been held on the first Friday in May. The traditional date conflicts with early voting that can occur at the Library at that time. Because the Library is an early voting location, a May election would make the Community Room unavailable for Staff Development Day. Last August, you approved the 2025-2026 holidays and closings calendar which included the change to the SDD date. SDD will be held on November 11, 2025. One of the ceremonies held during SDD is the presentation of **employee service awards**. These awards are given when a milestone anniversary (5, 10, 15 years, etc.) is reached during the fiscal year. With the move of SDD to November, an adjustment was needed to ensure these important milestone anniversaries were acknowledged. BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP PUBLIC LIBRARY PARTNER LIBRARY AGREEMENTS COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

The meeting of the Partner Library Agreements Committee was held in the Library on Wednesday, April 30, 2025.

Present: Trustees: Keith Carduner

Administration: Library Director, Tera Moon; Administrative Assistant Linden Godlove

Information regarding the three special agreements between Cranbrook Educational Community, Detroit Public Library and Troy Public Library and Bloomfield Township Public Library was reviewed. Use statistics and our previous signed agreements were shared along with updated agreements for review.

Trustee Keith Carduner inquired about the history of Detroit Public Library and the state funding, which then had provided access for everyone to Detroit Public Library. He expressed the many benefits of continuing these agreements, which are also straightforward to continue. He praised Cranbrook's many assets that Township residents can enjoy through this agreement.

Trustee Joy Murray communicated her support as well in communications with Director Moon via email and telephone. She raised the possibility of exploring agreements with other neighboring institutions. Director Moon indicated that the Michigan Activity Program largely fulfills these needs, and no further complex agreements are currently deemed necessary.

Bloomfield Township residents borrowed 1,923 Cranbrook Passes between April 1, 2024 – March 31, 2025. These passes provide access to the Institute of Science, Art Library, Art Museum, and House and Gardens at no charge. Our residents enjoy use of these excellent facilities. During this same period, 2,072 library items were borrowed by 295 Cranbrook students and faculty. Cranbrook students and faculty registered at Bloomfield Township Public Library are permitted to borrow up to 99 items and use library study rooms.

While a small number of Bloomfield Township residents use the DPL collections and services such as the Burton Historical collection, there are no other sources for this information. Without this agreement, our residents would be charged a \$100 non-resident fee for access. From April 2024 through March 2025, 87 DPL cardholders borrowed 396 items.

For some Bloomfield Township residents, Troy Public Library is closer to their homes. Also, Troy Public Library offers some interesting collections and services not offered at our Library, such as Experience Kits and a children's technology farm. 439 Troy Public Library patrons borrowed 2,200 items from our library last year.

This committee recommends renewing all three agreements and supports bringing the agreements to the entire Library Board at its next regularly scheduled meeting on Tuesday, May 20, 2025.

No future meeting has been scheduled at this time.

Updates from Library Director Tera Moon

Director Moon welcomed the Ambassadors Group. She has many updates to share and will take questions.

IMLS Funding and MeLCat

On March 14, 2025, President Trump issued an executive order proposing to cut funding to the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). This is the only federal agency supporting America's libraries. Bloomfield Township Public Library does not directly receive IMLS funds; they are channeled through the Library of Michigan (approximately \$5 million to MeLCat and for statewide library training). Loss of IMLS funding will indirectly impact Bloomfield Township Public Library. The extent is currently unknown. IMLS staff are reportedly on administrative leave. Current funding continues through September 2025. The Michigan Library Association (MLA) is seeking alternative funding sources for MeLCat and MeL, as is the Library of Michigan. Library Advocacy Day is tomorrow, April 30, with coordinated efforts to discuss this funding with state legislators. Katherine Bryant will participate in this effort in Lansing.

FY 25/26 Budget

The FY 25/26 budget was approved at the March board meeting. The Library is in a healthy financial position due to the voter-approved millage renewal. Budget approval is a primary duty of the Library Board of Trustees, along with evaluating the library director and approving policies.

Library Design Project Update

C2AE has been hired as the interior design and architecture firm to help redesign spaces around the Library. Currently this project is in the conceptual phase, using prior reports. The Library is working with Jenna Walker's pre-design and research report, which included data from trustees, patrons, and staff surveys. An initial block floor plan review identified underutilized spaces with plans to reimagine them, similar to relocating the media collection to allocate space to become the Commons. Proposed changes include moving stacks, increasing seating, relocating holds pickup near the Welcome Desk, moving the vending café to the magazine area, moving the Teen section to near the terrace door, and creating dedicated programming spaces for Adult and Teen Services. Reference desks will be moved for better sightlines, and some public services will be consolidated. Space definition will rely more on furniture than new construction. The goal is to create bustling front areas and quieter back areas. Director Moon hopes to have more to share with the Ambassadors at the July meeting.

Finance Coordinator

New Finance Coordinator Kathy Wolosiewicz is in place.

Al and hoopla

The Eagle featured a cover article about AI-generated content on hoopla. The Library offers digital content through Libby (curated) and hoopla (paid per borrow). The content is primarily summaries of books. Libraries have previously engaged with hoopla, owned by Midwest Tape. Hoopla states it is addressing the challenge of AI-generated content. Andy Saxe suggested an article about this for the newsletter. Laura Berg offered to reach out to a friend who works for Midwest Tape to start a conversation.

Library as a Precinct Location

9,000 people voted early during the presidential election at the Library. The Township has asked the Library to be a regular election day location for one precinct, in addition to serving as an early voting location. Trustees approved this. It is expected to involve a smaller number of voters. The Library requested extra lobby assistance.

Questions and Open Discussion

- Tera Moon reported on the Friends of the Library annual meeting, where State Librarian Adam Oster discussed Michigan Notable Books.
- Ambassadors shared about books recently read.
- An ambassador commented on the additional chamber music concert that followed the Friday performance, which was a request by the University of Michigan.
- Art from the Hills will be at the Library in a couple of weeks.
- WRCJ's remote broadcasts might offer a connection for chamber music.

The next meeting is scheduled for July 22, 2025, at 7:00 p.m.

One of a public library's most basic functions is to support literacy throughout the community. A highly tangible way that happens is through summer reading programs. Reading throughout the summer helps mitigate that infamous "summer slide." Summer slide refers to the loss of knowledge in reading and math during the summer break. To encourage kids to keep reading while they are not in school, library staff plan creative programs, games, and other incentives. They also help readers choose new books to read through book talks, reading lists by grade, and personalized recommendations.

At the May 20 Board meeting, librarians from Adult & Teen and Youth Services will be present to share what they and their colleagues have planned to engage readers of all ages through the summer months using the theme "Color Our World."

SUBJECT: Consider Expenditure for New Staff Computers

I am asking for approval of the purchase of new desktop and laptop computers for staff without using the Request for Proposal process. This purchase exceeds the \$25,000 threshold which requires trustee approval to bypass the Request for Proposal process.

Most staff computers are between six to eight years old and show increased signs of hardware failure, slower performance, and incompatibility with newer software. Additionally, these machines are running Windows 10, which will no longer be supported after October 14, 2025, and many of the current PCs do not meet the requirements for upgrading to Windows 11. The goal is to replace all staff computers by October 14, 2025, which is the end-of-support date of Windows 10.

The IT team has worked with The Library Network (TLN) to get a quote for the purchase of this new equipment. The models were chosen based on the standard configuration recommended by Dell and TLN for member institutions. A few key upgrades were made to better align with existing set-up and staff needs:

- Added an additional display port to support dual-monitor workstations
- Upgraded from 8GB to 16GB of RAM, matching our current performance standard
- Added 1TB of additional storage to shared-use machines for improved capacity and flexibility

This equipment chosen allows for a 1-to-1 swap of all current desktops and laptops. In addition to the hardware replacements, a couple of extra monitors, docks, and some spare laptops and desktops will be purchased. Equipment needs were determined based on the recommendations of department supervisors, who assessed the needs of their staff. The equipment being purchased is as follows:

78 Dell desktop computers10 monitors10 docks48 Dell laptops

Total price: \$96,263.81

To reduce the amount of equipment going into a landfill, the old equipment will be handled in the following ways:

- All old desktops will either be kept as backups/spares for catalog computers or public computers or sold at the next Used Equipment sale.
- Laptops in good condition will be kept as additional spares/backups.
- Laptops older than five years will be sold at the next Used Equipment sale.

This equipment will be purchased through TLN, which provides cooperative purchasing options for member libraries and institutions. TLN does this by conducting a competitive procurement process for its members and by negotiating pricing with vendors on behalf of its members, ensuring competitive rates and streamlined service. Additionally, TLN utilizes discount pricing through the Midwestern Higher Education Compact (MHEC), which further reduces costs for members. You may recall that we purchased last year's upgraded server through the MHEC contract. That experience was efficient, cost-effective, and well-aligned with our needs.

By purchasing through TLN, the Library will get the best price on equipment that best suits the Library's needs, will make an easy transition for users, and will save significant time and administrative effort. This purchase reflects ongoing efforts to maintain a secure, reliable, and modern technology environment for staff.

If you support this proposal, a motion is needed.

SUBJECT: Partner Library Agreements: Cranbrook Educational Community, Detroit Public Library, and Troy Public Library

For several years, Bloomfield Township Public Library has had special agreements with Cranbrook Educational Community (CEC), Detroit Public Library (DPL), and Troy Public Library (TPL), which have benefited our patrons and the patrons of these organizations. These libraries are outside of our cooperative, The Library Network (TLN), therefore our patrons would not have access to them. The agreements are on a three-year cycle, and now is the time to consider renewing them for another three years. Communications have been taking place with each of the organizations. I am pleased to report that our agreement with the Cranbrook Educational Community and Troy Public Library will continue for another three years. Detroit Public Library opted to not renew the agreement.

A representative for DPL said that library has been part of the MILibraryCard program since 2014 and wants to standardize their reciprocal borrowing procedures using this program. Additionally, DPL's Special Collections (such as the Burton Historical Archives) are now freely accessible to all visitors, without requiring a library card. The representative said that DPL will continue to honor our patrons' existing library cards until their expiration (two years from renewal), and we will reciprocate for DPL cardholders. Library Administration will work with Circulation staff to inform our patrons of this change. A small number of Bloomfield Township residents use the DPL collections. From April 1, 2024-March 31, 2025, 87 DPL cardholders borrowed 396 items. Notably, DPL graciously offered a special presentation about these collections and a tour of their facilities.

Bloomfield Township residents borrowed 1,923 Cranbrook Passes between April 1, 2024-March 31, 2025. These passes provide access to Cranbrook's Institute of Science, Art Library, Art Museum, and House and Gardens at no charge. Our residents are very pleased to have access to these wonderful facilities. During this same time, 2,072 library items were borrowed by 295 Cranbrook students and faculty. Cranbrook students and faculty registered at Bloomfield Township Public Library are permitted to borrow up to 99 items and use library study rooms. For this contract, representatives from Cranbrook offered to increase the number of items that can be borrowed by our patrons at the Cranbrook Academy of Art Library from two items to ten. They reported

having "some BTPL 'regulars' and have allowed up to ten items and are happy to continue to accommodate that request."

Our agreement with the Troy Public Library includes an automatic three-year renewal unless either party provides a written notice of termination. Through discussions with Troy Public Library Director Emily Dumas, both our organizations recognize the mutual benefits of this agreement for our communities and recommend its continuation. Specifically, the Troy Public Library offers closer access for some Bloomfield Township residents and provides unique resources like Experience Kits and a children's technology farm, which are not currently available at our Library. Usage statistics from the past year demonstrate this reciprocal benefit: 439 Troy Public Library patrons borrowed 2,200 items from our library, while 132 Bloomfield Township residents borrowed 4,713 items from the Troy Public Library.

Updated agreements between Cranbrook Educational Community and Troy Public Library and Bloomfield Township Public Library follow this memo. New dates for each agreement are the only proposed changes from the previous agreements approved in 2022. The Partner Library Agreements Committee supports my recommendation to approve these special agreements.

Thank you for your review and consideration. If you agree, the following motion is needed.

ACTION: I move that Bloomfield Township Public Library renew the agreements with the Cranbrook Educational Community and Troy Public Library for a three-year term as stated in the agreements.

RECIPROCAL BORROWING AGREEMENT

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP PUBLIC LIBRARY TROY PUBLIC LIBRARY

This Agreement is entered into on this 20th day of May, 2025 by and between parties Bloomfield Township Public Library (BTPL) and the Troy Public Library (TPL).

This renewed Agreement, for three years, shall commence on July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2028 and shall be automatically renewed for subsequent three-year terms unless BTPL or TPL provides written notice of termination to the other party at least 60 days prior to the expiration of the term.

BTPL: All residents of the City of Troy Michigan and employees of TPL possessing valid Troy Public Library cards will have borrowing privileges of up to ten cumulative items from the BTPL. Additionally, except as set forth above, all residents of the City of Troy, Michigan and employees of TPL possessing valid Troy Public Library cards shall have access to all BTPL collections, per BTPL's existing policy of circulation to non-residents.

TPL: All residents of the Charter Township of Bloomfield, Michigan and employees of BTPL possessing valid Bloomfield Township Public Library cards will have borrowing privileges of up to ten cumulative items from the TPL. Additionally, all residents of Bloomfield Township, Michigan and employees of BTPL possessing valid Bloomfield Township Public Library cards shall have access to all TPL collections.

BTPL and TPL agree that residents of the Charter Township of Bloomfield, Michigan or residents of the City of Troy and all library employees who use the reciprocal library under this Agreement must comply with the ordinances, regulations, rules and procedures concerning the library. BTPL and TPL will notify the other party if a reciprocal user is in violations of its ordinances, regulations, rules and procedures and specify the nature of the violation for the purposes of determining the effectiveness of the continuation of this Agreement by the parties.

Neither the Charter Township of Bloomfield Michigan nor the City of Troy assumes responsibility, financial or otherwise, for accidents or injuries sustained by reciprocal users while on its property.

The parties may terminate this Reciprocal Borrowing Agreement at any time, with or without cause, by providing a minimum 60 days written notification to the other party.

Bloomfield Township Public Library and Cranbrook Educational Community Cooperative Relationship

This Agreement is entered into this 20th day of May, 2025 by and between the Bloomfield Township Public Library ("BTPL") and Cranbrook Educational Community ("CEC"). This renewed Agreement, which shall be for a period of three (3) years, commencing on June 1, 2025 through May 31, 2028, shall provide that:

1. BTPL Facilities: All Cranbrook and Art Academy students, staff and faculty will have borrowing privileges and access to study rooms at the BTPL. All residents of Cranbrook, including family members, also will have borrowing privileges and access to study rooms at the BTPL.

2. CEC Facilities: Residents and employees of Bloomfield Township will receive the following privileges at specific CEC facilities, including:

a. Cranbrook Academy of Art Library: On-site access to the Cranbrook Academy of Art Library for reading, research and photocopying. Circulation privileges at the Cranbrook Academy of Art Library, with a limit of ten items per borrower. This excludes reference materials, rare and special collection books, periodicals, as these are all non-circulating.

b. Cranbrook Archives: By-appointment access to the Cranbrook Archives;

c. Cranbrook Centennial Pass: Cranbrook has issued 250 Cranbrook Passes ("Passes") to the BTPL on May 1, 2010 to be used throughout the term of this Agreement. Cranbrook will, in addition to the foregoing, provide such additional Passes as may be necessary to meet the demand for Passes during the period of the Agreement. Said Passes will be made available at BTPL as a "circulation" item to Bloomfield Township residents, property owners and employees with a valid BTPL borrower's card. BTPL shall circulate said Passes in accordance with policy as established by the BTPL Library Board of Trustees. The Pass will allow free general admission access for a Pass holder and one guest to Cranbrook Institute of Science, Cranbrook Art Museum, and Cranbrook House and Gardens during normal public hours. The BTPL will be identified as the holder of the Pass on the reverse side.

3. Exhibits: BTPL and CEC will cooperate to provide for CEC's collections or programmatic areas to be highlighted in a series of rotating exhibits at BTPL, each to last one month. Each exhibit should include images of pertinent CEC spaces, text panels; object labels, and of course objects as well. It should be

noted that security, lighting, environmental conditions, cabinet space, and other factors may preclude CEC from displaying some of its more valuable materials. CEC and BTPL will cooperate in developing a speaker series, wherein CEC staff and faculty could present on various themes. Additionally, BTPL will provide space of its choosing to display acceptable Cranbrook marketing literature for public consumption while the exhibits are on display. At least six weeks lead-time would be required before each exhibit could be mounted.

4. Special Programs: CEC will work with the BTPL in providing special tours and visitation programs at CEC facilities for Bloomfield Township residents, property owners and employees with a valid BTPL borrower's card.

5. Indemnification: CEC agrees to defend and indemnify BTPL, its agents, employees, representatives, officers and director's against and hold BTPL harmless from any and all liability, loss, damage, cost, expense (including attorney's fees), claim, demand, judgment or other action, whether pending or threatened, which arises out of or is in any way related to the use and/or occupation of the BTPL facilities by CEC students, staff, faculty and families of CEC boarders. Nothing herein shall be deemed to require CEC to indemnify BTPL, its agents, officers, trustees or employees, from any loss or damage which is caused solely by the negligence or willful misconduct of BTPL, its agents, employees, representatives, officers or directors. The provisions of this Section shall survive any termination of this Agreement.

This Agreement shall be for a period of three (3) years, with an annual evaluation for any adverse effects on either party, in which event, good faith consideration will be given to modification or termination. This Agreement may be terminated by either party, without cause, upon six month's written notice given to the other.

SUBJECT: Strategic Plan

Work continues on the strategic plan, with committees meeting as needed to advance their goals.

1. Reimagine use of library spaces for increased inclusion and flexibility. (Enhance Our Core)

C2AE and the library design team, Tera Moon, Katherine Bryant, Adult and Teen Services Assistant Department Head Brooke Hoskins, Youth Services Assistant Department Head Lauren Catoni-Ellis, and Trustee Joy Murray, met twice in May. At a meeting on May 1, the group reviewed the conceptual design and program, then moved into the schematic design phase, with a discussion about themes, a design statement, and imagery. The group also reviewed the process and timeline. At a meeting on May 15, the group reviewed the furniture procurement process and everyone's role in that, including a furniture field trip on May 29 and a furniture fair to share options with the staff and public.

2. Update recruiting, hiring, on-boarding, and retention practices using a diversity, equity, and inclusion lens. (Build Organizational Capacity)

The HR Committee shared a memo and revised forms (the Application Rating Worksheet and the Interview Rating Form) with Tera and Katherine for review. Committee Co-chairs Jen Taggart and Laura J. Kraly will meet with Tera and Katherine to discuss further in early June.

3. Cultivate a collaborative culture by focusing on how we work together. (Build Organizational Capacity)

The Collaborative Culture Committee is preparing to send out an employee satisfaction survey by the end of the month, which is an optional, anonymous survey to assess the current state of our workplace culture. Results will only be shared with the Library Director. In addition, the committee has worked with Tera to create an anonymous feedback form, which Tera will share with staff in the June Monthly Staff Training.

Completed Activities:

ENHANCE OUR CORE...to create responsive collections, functional and comfortable spaces, and seamless digital experience.

Goal 1: Anticipate collections to develop in response to community needs that inform, entertain, and expand world view.

- Created a location code for Teen items.
- Added PressReader, ComicsPlus, and myfilmfriend to the Library's digital offerings.
- Updated the 200s to the alternate arrangement, which organizes religious subjects more equitably by chronology and geography, rather than centering on Christianity.
- Updated call numbers in Youth Services better reflect how patrons interact with the collections. 'Beginning to Read' is now 'Early Reader,' and 'Easy' is now 'Picture.'

- Engaged Jenna Walker of Parini to create and present a Pre-design and Research Report for Library Renovation.
- Implemented new study room reservation system.
- Updated the early childhood area with new seating and interactive toys.
- Hired C2AE to provide library design and space planning services in early 2025.

Goal 3: Proactively provide access to innovative technology resources, support, and education to support robust digital experiences at all stages of life.

- Launched BTPL Mobile App in fall 2023.
- Launched Vega, an updated public online catalog, in March 2024.

CONNECT THE COMMUNITY...with each other, with opportunities to be creative, and with new experiences.

Goal 1: Bring people together around diverse interests and thought-provoking topics.

- Launched The Distracted Librarians podcast.
- Celebrated the Library's 60th anniversary with over 500 patrons at the Applause, Applause event on October 5, 2024.
